Update on Alumni: Luis Cruz



It has been great being back home! Family wise, we have a daughter, Sofina, who is now almost 16 months old, and we are expecting another in November. I have to catch up to the rest of my siblings...but I think we are stopping at 2 kids. I love being a dad, I had a lot of practice carrying babies during residency :). We are in the process of building a house which has been very stressful, almost ready to break ground. (Every house on Guam has to be concrete to withstand the strong typhoons that often hit the island.)

Work wise, I joined a multi-specialty clinic - 5 FPs, 1 pediatrician, 1 Internal med/Endocrinologist. My practice now is about 80% primary care and 20% sports medicine/occupational medicine. I take hospital call 1 week out of 5 which isn't too bad - we only admit our clinic patients. I enjoy my prac-

tice environment and the clinic is looking to expand to have a dedicated sports medicine/occupational medicine/ physical therapy clinic, hopefully within a year or so. I have started doing prolotherapy and some acupuncture - these modalities are slowly picking up interest.

Sports medicine wise, 2011 was very exciting. I was the team doc for the Guam boys national soccer team in the under-13 Festival of Football 2011 in Beijing, China. It was amazing watching the soccer teams from China, Japan, and Korea as they were very disciplined and talented at such a young age. Guam soccer is a developing program so we did not do so well. I did make it to the Great Wall.



I was also the physician for Team Guam during the Pacific Games in New Caledonia (French Polynesia) - very beautiful country and got to learn some French. France's now defeated President Sarkozy, was present at the opening ceremony. Being the

Pacific games, rugby, beach volleyball, and paddling (outrigger canoe) are very popular events. I was kept pretty busy with minor injuries but thankfully no serious ones. No gold for Guam this time but did get a few silver and bronze medals.

Guam sends a team to the Olympics and I was hoping to go this year, but another physician was already chosen. Hopefully, I will be able to go to Brazil in 2016.

So that is pretty much everything that has happened since residency/fellowship. I do want to say, I feel that residency and fellowship has prepared me well and I am very grateful to all the faculty members, fellow residents, nurses, staff and patients. I miss you all. Take care and hopefully we can visit soon. We are very excited that Dr. Cruz said he would be happy to host a resident if they wanted to do an elective in Guam. The Medical and Legal Partnership Conference

The conference was a great success, a gathering of Medical and Legal partners from around the country. We presented in conjunction with two other programs in regards to our "advance directive clinics." Officially the presentation was regarding how to set up such clinics in a cooperative fashion between lawyers and doctors, and utilize both fields to facilitate the community on filling out their own advance directives. We function largely as educators, teaching people why advance directives are important, and how they work. we also assist the community members who want to fill their own advance directive out at the time. The presentation outlined our structure, and discussed strategies to help others form similar community outreach projects in their own MLP system. In an informal fashion, this also served as a model for cooperation between a residency and an MLP office (i.e. Anne Ryan's position). We modeled and discussed in the presentation how we utilize the enthusiasm of residents to support and enhance Anne's work in advance directives, while also enhancing the education and community outreach of the residents involved. 
