We connect graduates with employers to apply for jobs and paid apprenticeships. Training is online via Zoom and built for real life. We welcome applicants from all backgrounds in the following counties: Maricopa, Pima, Santa Cruz, Yuma, Cochise, and Graham.

- Approximately six months, 160 hours. Monthly stipend plus completion bonus; scholarship to cover training costs.
- 144 hours live online classes
- 16 hours shadowing with a partner site
- Optional, 12-month, 2,000-hour Apprenticeship: Full-time, on-site with employer wages/benefits and Project FUTRE stipend support.
